The Adviser has contractually agreed to waive its fees and/or absorb expenses of the Fund to ensure that net annual fund operating expenses (excluding acquired fund fees and expenses, interest, taxes and extraordinary expenses) do not exceed 1.68% of average daily net assets of the Investor Class and 1.28% of the average daily net assets of the Institutional Class. This contract's term is in effect through at least February 28, 2027, and may be terminated only by the Trust's Board of Trustees (the "Board"). The net expense ratio represents what investors have paid as of the prospectus dated 02/28/2026.

From time to time the Fund may invest in shares of companies through initial public offerings (IPOs). IPOs have the potential to produce substantial gains. There is no assurance that the Fund will have continued access to profitable IPOs and as the Fund's assets grow, the impact of an IPO investment may decline. Investor Class shares were originally offered on June 29, 2007; Institutional Class shares were originally offered on October 25, 2011. Performance shown prior to the inception of the Institutional Class reflects the performance of the Investor Class and includes expenses that are not applicable to and are higher than those of the Institutional Class.

The Bloomberg US 2000® Value Index is screened from the Bloomberg US 2000 Index and is constructed based on a linear combination of risk factors. The four factors are: 1) Earnings Yield, 2) Valuation, 3) Dividend Yield and 4) Growth. The factors are equally weighted when forming a composite signal where Growth is considered to be a negative indicator and thus flipped to be a negative. The Index is market-capitalization-weighted. The index does not reflect the payment of transaction costs, fees and expenses associated with an investment in the Fund.
